Updates from the Tribal Council

Gaming Update

We want to update you on the gaming project. Stations and Cannery have chosen to terminate our agreements. They have said that they spoke with the senator from Nevada, and he told them that he will do everything that he can to stop any gaming projects that are on Interstate 15. Interstate 15 runs from San Bernardino (greater Los Angeles area) to Las Vegas. Stations says it is this senator's opinion that it would have a negative impact on the business in Las Vegas and he has an obligation to his people and business there to protect their interests. We think that there is more to the story but we don't know and probably will never know. This was something that we knew could happen and it did. The developers were from Las Vegas and maybe the senator had more pull with them then he would have with a developer from somewhere else. We do not owe Stations or Cannery any money. We are looking for another developer who is willing to take on all of the challenges this project will have, and we have received a substantial amount of interest. There will be a lot of opposition from other tribes, the

public and senators across the country. We will keep pushing forward. We are scheduled later this month to go and meet with the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs in Washington DC to discuss the gaming project. It is possible that the BIA will discourage us from trying to get land in Hesperia. We hope not but will not be surprised if that is what they say. Taking land into trust for gaming is getting harder and harder to do. There is a big push in California to stop new Indian gaming projects. We are also looking at developing projects on the land the Tribe already has. The Tribe doesn't have the money to develop a business without some developer to provide the money for any projects. We have been using some of the gaming money to work with a developer on a hotel project in Death Valley. Without the money from the gaming developer this is also going to be difficult. We could build a casino on some of the land we already have but, it would not be as big and wonderful as the one we have been hoping for in Hesperia. However, it would be a start. If you have any ideas on this let us know.

Tribal Council Updates Continued

Constitution

The Constitution Election has been cancelled and will be rescheduled. If you voted, you will need to vote again. If you did not get to vote you will get another chance to register and vote later. There has been a lot of confusion concerning the Constitution. One of the questions that has been coming up is why do we need a new Constitution when we already have one? Technically the Tribe does not have a Constitution. The Constitution was submitted to the Bureau of Indian Affairs early on but was rejected. The reason it was rejected is because in order for the Bureau of Indian Affairs to approve a Constitution for a tribe, that tribe must have land in trust. When the Constitution was initially submitted we did not have any land. In 2000 when the Homeland Act went into effect and we acquired land we were eligible to submit the Constitution for a secretarial election at that time. This did not happen. This is why the Tribal Council and the Constitution Committee spent almost a year looking at what changes we needed to make in order for the Constitution to be functional. One of the challenges that the Constitution addresses is internal disputes and how to resolve those disputes without destroying the Tribe. We took a look at some of the problems that have occurred over the last 15 years. The biggest problems that the Tribe has faced are internal disputes. These are devastating to the Tribe in every way. With the revised Constitution we have a remedy for these disputes. Enrollment in recent times has been an issue as well. There was an amendment to the enrollment ordinance passed in 1986 including the people listed on the 1936 census. With this revision of the Constitution that 1936 census was included in the Constitution under the enrollment requirements. This does NOT allow for a whole new group of people to be enrolled. The same people that were eligible for membership in 1986 will be the same people eligible for membership after the revised Constitution has been approved. If you have any questions on this feel free to call the office. The revised Constitution also addresses terms in office. The people who have been on Tribal Council will understand why we need this. Two-year terms are not long enough for a person to function effectively

as a Tribal Council member. About the time a person understands how the Tribal Council needs to function they're up for election. If they are not reelected than a new person comes in and they have to learn how things are done so as a Tribal Council we are not able to function as effectively as we will with four-year terms. Also, elections are expensive and we will save money by not having one every year.

The Constitutional election had to be withdrawn. Because of the shutdown of the federal government, the BIA could not comply with the timelines in the federal regulations. We have resubmitted the Constitution for the secretarial election. There has been a lot of confusion over the process of conducting a secretarial election. When you receive the new packet from the Bureau of Indian Affairs this is the process that we need to follow.

1-Register to vote. Similar to local elections (city, state, county, federal etc.) you have to send in a voter registration in order to be able to vote. It is similar to when you go to the Department of Motor Vehicles to get your drivers license they ask you if you want to be a registered voter. If you do not register you will not be able to vote. There was a ballot included in the packet. That ballot should of said sample ballot on it. So remember register first.

2-Vote. After you have registered your name will be placed on a registered voter's list. We post this list at the office for people to view. Your name should appear on this list if you have registered. After you have successfully registered for the election you will receive an official ballot in the mail. After you receive that ballot you may vote and send that ballot back to the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

3-Wait for results. The election board is made up of one BIA official and the Tribe's election committee. The election committee will travel to Sacramento to count the votes along with the BIA official. The revised Constitution gives the General Council more authority and more control over the Tribe. When the Tribal Council was taking a look at the revisions to the Constitution we took into consideration that one day we'll be General Council members and not Tribal Council members. We wanted to ensure that the General Council had authority to resolve issues if the

Tribal Council was unable to resolve them such as internal disputes. We have also updated the Constitution to be able to use current technology. Under the revised Constitution would be able to conduct a General Council meeting over the phone, Internet and various other electronic means.

General Council meeting

The annual meeting of the General Council was held at the Bishop office on October 26th. As you might guess, we did not have enough General Council members present to achieve quorum. Therefore we were unable to conduct any official business. We are putting together an annual financial report that way you know where and how the Tribe's money has been spent. We want you to know that the money is being managed well. Along with the financial report there will be various other reports in there for you to read.

Election

It is that time of year again. Your participation in the annual general election is very important. This is where you get to select who is going to be managing the tribe's affairs. Vote wisely. But vote. Your vote makes a difference.

The fight goes on.

I'm sure some of you are aware that there have been several appeals filed concerning the Constitutional election. Two appeals were filed on behalf of Joe Kennedy by the Indian Law Resource Center. The Indian Law Resource Center is an advocate for indigenous peoples rights. Their press release states, "*the Indian Law resource Center is a nonprofit law and advocacy organization established and directed by American Indians. The center is based in Helena, Montana and also has an office in Washington, DC. We provide legal assistance without charge to Indian and Alaskan native nations who are working to protect their lands, resources, human rights, environment, and cultural heritage. Our principal goal is the preservation and well-being of Indiana and other native nations and tribes.*" The Indian Law resource Center is

attempting to stop you from exercising your right to vote on a Tribal Constitution. At the same time they claim to fight for indigenous peoples rights. It is your right as a tribal member to choose whether or not you want to approve the revised Constitution.

Kennedy also appealed the eligible voters list for the Constitution election. This appeal was internal to the Election Board, and he was represented on this appeal by Dentons, a super-large international law firm. The Tribe has had to spend over \$30,000 to defend itself in federal litigation that Joe Kennedy, Paulina Esteves, Madeline Esteves, and Erick Mason continue to pursue. The United States District Court dismissed their appeal this past April, now they have filed an appeal with the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. They are represented by George Forman's law firm for this case. The cost to the Tribe will continue to increase as we defend ourselves against this. It is very possible that these legal issues will stop us from attracting a new developer for the casino. It is also possible that the city will not work with us with this dispute still hanging over our head. These are things you need to think about and be aware of.

Finally, Kennedy has also threatened litigation against the Tribe concerning his RSTF check. For this challenge he is using Jack Duran as his attorney. In case you lost count, this means that Joe Kennedy has four different law firms working on litigation against our Tribe. We are very confident that we will be successful with regard to all of these challenges. It would be nice if we could spend the funds we have on something besides defending lawsuits from our own members.

Existing FEMA Units

Hopefully in the next 2 to 3 weeks we will start a crew to repair, build porches and clean the FEMA units already setup. Tribal Council will be considering occupants for the vacant units in the near future. HUD has directed the Tribe to do the necessary maintenance or renovations necessary and get the units occupied.

New FEMA Units.

The Council is considering what to do with the units already in the valley and the 5 additional units we are scheduled to receive. At this time, one or two of the units in the valley could be pulled out to another location so we are still accepting applications to utilize those units.

RHED Solar Project

We have had to change our approach on this project as the original grant was for feasibility and design for Solar projects, not the actual installation. Therefore I am in the process of issuing a Request For Proposals to develop Solar projects on the various parcels of land.

Elder's Advisory Committee

The Tribe is seeking interested Tribal Elders in our area to be on the Elder's Advisory Committee for Tribal Historic Preservation. We are in need of two Tribal Elders to fill the committee. Elders interested in joining this committee must be able to travel to our Tribal Lands. There will not be excessive walking or exercise. You will be asked for input for Tribal Historic Preservation. Updates from the Tribal Administrator

BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS:

I would like to inform you the Tribal Members of what is included in the BIA Yearly Consolidated Tribal Government Program (CTGP) Grant, for your knowledge.

CGTP Grant: *The purpose of the CTGP grant is to provide funding to operate the essential Tribal Government functions (see below). The funding amounts fluctuate from year-to-year depending on the Congressional appropriations of a particular year. Which makes it very hard to structure an adequate budget from year-to-year for the tribe, when the Tribe receives only partial funding for the entire tribal government operations. The appropriations committees in the House of Representatives and the Senate are responsible for twelve annual appropriations bills that fund the federal government. The appropriations committees are supposed to allocate the annual appropriations by the end of September of each year, because FY2013 begins on October 1, 2013. The Timbisha Shoshone Tribe has received \$ 184,874.00 for the FY013- 14 CTPG allocations, with an additional \$29,223.00 for Contract Support Costs (CSC), for a total grant of \$211,097.00. Therefore, the Congress will pass a continuing appropriations resolution ("CR") to provide temporary funding for some period of time in FY2014, in some instances.*

i. SALARIES:

Tribal Administrator: *to manage the daily operation of Aid to Tribal Government Program and Tribal Administrative Departments.*

Secretary/ Receptionist: *to assist the Tribal Administrator and tribal staff with the daily operation of Tribal office.*

Financial Officer: *to assist and support the tribal operation of Aid to Tribal Government Program and Administrative Department Grants.*

Custodial/ Maintenance: *to assist with sanitation of the tribal building and ground work.*

Benefits & Taxes: *to support the Employees benefits and taxes.*

ii. CONTRACTUAL SERVICES:

Consulting: *to assist and support the tribal operation of Aid to Tribal Government Program.*

Audit Expenses: *to hire and conduct the required A-133 Single Audit Reports.*

iii. OPERATING EXPENSES:

Office Supplies: *to purchase copy paper (legal & letter size), pens, envelopes, pencils, ink jets, folders for direct program operation of ATIG.*

Postage & delivery: *to purchase postage stamps, mail certified letter, and UPS service.*

Office Equipment & furniture: *to purchase computer software, hardware, printer, and scanner.*

Travel & Training: *travel expenses of hotel, airline, meals & per Diem for tribal employees to attend conference, meeting.*

Communication: *to pay monthly telephone and Internet service bills.*

Tribal Property Insurance: *Insurance coverage for tribal office, vehicles.*

Office Rent: *monthly rental payment for office space of 100 cubic feet to house office employees to operate Aid to Tribal Government program (\$X,XXX x 12 months= \$XX,XXX).*

Utilities: *monthly payments of electric (\$XXX x 12), gas (\$XXX x 12), water and sewer (\$XXX x 12).*

NATIONAL PARK SERVICE (NPS)

In speaking with the NPS Road Facilities Director he informed me that all staff was on furlough due to the Government shutdown and due to this the Tribal/NPS quarterly meeting had to be cancelled. The Tribe/NPS meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, October 16, 2013 at the Death Valley Visitor's Center. Since the Government shut down is over, the Tribe is waiting to hear from the NPS for the rescheduled date of the quarterly meeting. In addition, the Bonnie Clare Road Project Pre-Construction Road Project had been cancelled until further notice as of the date of this report. The Tribe will keep you updated as to the upcoming meeting information.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE (IHS)

I will be contacting Indian Health Service Project Engineer on the possibility of the funding the installation of water meters for the DV Indian Village units and future work on the

WESTERN SHOSHONE EDUCATIONAL TRUST FUNDS UPDATE JULY 15, 2013

The Western Shoshone Judgment individual applicants' may request education funds once the process has been established. Only those individual who eligibility requirements and identified on the Western judgment Fund distribution list may receive assistance.

The Western Shoshone Education Trust Fund – Administrative Committee with representatives appointed from the four tribes of Western Shoshone, two Western Shoshone Committees and an At Large representative appointed by the Secretary of the Interior.

The Committee has started the initial process of establishing the By-Laws and will be developing procedures and guidelines for the application process.

The Administrative Committee had submitted application, eligibility criteria and financial packet at the end of April 2013 for approval to the Secretary of the Interior and was returned to the Administrative committee on July 2013, with a **setback**, which will affect distributing funds for the 2013 fall semester.

They do not specify the amount of monies that is in the Education Fund, just *limited*. Only the interest portion of the fund is to be used AND IN "PERPETUITY". The average annual interest is around \$60,000.00. That depends on the stock market, which it invested to earn the interests that are to be used from the trust funds. Also, they need to consider the amount of applications from the Western Shoshone student's descendants and the "unknowns" has to be considered.

The Western Shoshone Education Trust Fund is to be used for education grants or education assistance to those qualified members and is *not a BIA function*. Applications will eventually be available online, at the tribal offices and at the Western and Eastern Nevada Bureau of Indian Affairs offices.

The Tribe wants to thank Helen Beaman for sending in this letter of updates on the Western Shoshone Educational Trust Funds. We apologize for not putting it in our last Newsletter and know the importance of getting this information to you.

Solid Waste Cleanup Update

Due to the government shutdown for the first 2 weeks of October, we were unable to finish the dumpsite clean-ups in Scotty's Junction and Lida. While we had the workers and tools needed to complete this task, October 1st was the beginning of a new fiscal year. This means that we are now working out of a new grant- a grant that does not have "dump site clean-up" as one of the tasks. It is fairly simple to add this task into this fiscal year's grant, but due to the government being shut down, we were unable to get approval to make this change (this is also the reason we put the CWA stream bank project on hold). If we work on/complete any task without approval from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) project officer, we risk the possibility of not being able to drawdown the funds for that task.

However, as of October 16th, the government is no longer shutdown and we can now get approval for additional tasks. The grant work plan (the list of all the approved tasks) is currently being changed and updated. Once that is complete and the new work plan is approved, the dump site clean-up will begin again. At that time, we will re-advertise for environmental laborers and accept new applications for employment. Be sure to check the website weekly for updates!

Emergency Management

A major component in this year's work plan will be emergency management. I think that it is a priority to have a plan in place, in case an emergency or disaster was to occur. As a task of last year's grant work plan, I completed the Interim Emergency Response Notification Plan (ERNP). However, this plan is just a basic, temporary plan until the full Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) is completed.

While drafting the EOP, I will coordinate with the Death Valley National Park Service and Inyo County's emergency managers to comply with their emergency plans. I will also work with the Tribal Council and Timbisha staff to ensure that each and every department can provide their

input, as well as understand their roles in an emergency. I would also like to host a meeting or two with Tribal members. These meetings will provide a place for members (specifically members living in the Village because it is the EOP for the Village) to give their input, suggestions, and comments on the plan. As these members are living in the Village, they will have much more insight to what their concerns and needs are in the event of an emergency. These meeting dates have not been set yet, but will be advertised on the Timbisha website, and invitations will be sent out when the dates have been decided.

Indoor Air Quality Training

Air quality is a component of this year's grant work plan, so on October 15th and 16th, I attended the Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) training in Lone Pine, CA. At this training I learned about air pollutants, health problems associated with poor air quality, and ways to improve indoor air quality. Below are some tips on how to improve the air quality in your home.

Increase ventilation: Proper ventilation with outdoor air is a key component for good indoor air quality. You can do this by opening windows, turning on your heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system, and keeping up with the maintenance of your HVAC system.

Read Labels: Many household cleaning products instruct users to use that product in a well-ventilated room. Using these cleaning products in a tight-space room with little to no ventilation (i.e. a bathroom) can be harmful and decrease your indoor air quality. Be sure to read the labels on cleaning products to ensure proper use.

Prevent mold: All molds have the potential to cause health effects and can be found anywhere and grow on virtually any organic substance. The key to mold control is moisture control! Some things you can do to prevent mold growth is: clean and dry any wet or damp spots within 48 hours; fix leaky plumbing and roof leaks as soon as possible; check regularly for condensation and wet spots; address sources of moisture problems as soon as possible; and maintain indoor humidity levels below 60% when possible.

EPA Region 9 Tribal Conference

From October 21st-24th, Cathy Cottonwood and I will be attending the EPA Region 9 Tribal Conference in Lemoore, CA. This conference will provide me with a chance to attend various training sessions about different environmental issues (solid waste, water, air quality, etc.). After the training, I will put information on the Timbisha website regarding the different sessions I attended, and useful information.

Indigenous Farming Project

After my meeting with Anya Kamenskaya and May Nguyen from the Indigenous Farming Project (IFP) in Death Valley, I continued correspondence with them via email to discuss project ideas. In addition to the possible community garden in Death Valley, Anya, May and I have discussed a project with the mesquite. Both of these projects are feasible in Death Valley and, in time, would allow the members in the Village to host a farmer's market. The meeting to discuss the IFP will be on Friday, November 1st at 2:00pm in the Death Valley Indian Village Community Center; snacks and refreshments will be provided. At this meeting, Cathy Cottonwood and I will also talk about "going green" and various water topics. For those that cannot attend the meeting, but have an interest in the project or the information that will be given, I will put an article explaining what was discussed and/or decided at the meeting on the Timbisha website.

Water Quality Update

Our department started the new fiscal year on October 1st. The Tribe's EPA consultant worked with us to revised the new work plans and calculate the budgets for the Clean Water Act (CWA) Section 106, Water Pollution Control and the CWA S-319, Non-Point Source Pollution Control Program for FY-2014.

I have browsed a number of online sites to research information to increase my knowledge of water issues for the best management practices under the guidelines of these two programs. This is required for the deliverables that are needed in Water Quality Reporting. The EPA Director and I will be attending an EPA conference from October 21st – October 25th in Lemoore, CA. I will be updating you on the information from the conference in the next newsletter.

Tribal and Community Center service line. **UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA) ARRA GRANT – WILDLAND-URBAN INTERFACE (WUI) PROJECT FUEL REDUCTION PROJECT**

The remaining funding from this project has been processed and submitted by Pacific Regional office. The funding of the remaining WUI funds (\$17,051.72) have been deposited into the Tribe Indian Forest Land Assistance Account, bringing the total amount of funds, which have been deposited to \$56,513.17, including the previous transfer of \$39,461.65. As you might recall the Tribe received the ARRA (USFS) funds of \$49,825.00 and the BIA funds of \$8,000.00 previously, which brings the total amount of funds to \$114,338.37. The original amount projected for the WUI project was \$113,825.00. We will be gathering all the information on this project and complete a final report to you within the end of the year. The \$56,513.17 will need to be transferred into the tribe's bank account, within the month. I will have the Chairman process the final documents for transfer of the funds.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON (SCE) GRANT ASSISTANCE FUNDING

As of October 10, 2013 I received an e-mail informing the Tribe that the SCE has approved the \$25,000.00 grant for the 2014 year. Please see below:


