Updates from the Tribal Chairman

Gaming Project

On the gaming front we have had a setback in our moving forward with our gaming venture. It was brought to our attention that there would be political opposition to our gaming project in the area of Hesperia. With this opposition it will be very hard if not impossible to move forward in that area. Our developers brought this to our attention as quickly as they found out. We appreciate that they brought this to our attention in a timely manner and that they came to the Tribal Office in Bishop to tell us the bad news. With their announcement they also presented a backup plan for the Tribe. The developers suggested we move our project into a different area. They had a few suggestions, which we discussed with them. We discussed an area that has a population of over 300,000 and growing.

This a good base from which to attract families and people with disposable incomes. The median income in this area is over \$50,000 a year. This is in comparison with Hesperia with a population of over 90,000 and a median income of under \$50,000. The investors thought that with these numbers a project could proceed in this new area.

Other Development

The Tribe is still pursuing other development so that the Tribe can gain additional income. We are still looking into a hotel and other developments that will be money producers for the Tribe. We have secured a hotel developer to help us with this project. Hopefully we can get some new development in Death Valley that will both employ our Tribal people and make the Tribe money at the same time. This would help to increase jobs so that more Tribal members could live in Death Valley.

Updates from the Tribal Administrator

BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS

Indian Reservation Roads (IRR): Well, we've had a change in the Tribal Transportation Planner position. Mr. Piper has resigned his position as of August 22nd. Before Mr. Piper's departure he submitted a well developed "draft" Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP). Also, the BIA Pacific Regional office has sent the Tribe Amendment #1 to the BIA Transportation Agreement Referenced Funding Agreement. This amendment will add \$34,527.35 to the BIA Transportation Grant for a total of \$66,941.85 for the FY 2013. The Tribe will review the "draft" TIP in detail and make the proper revisions or approve as submitted. As for a Transportation Planner, the Tribe will be reviewing the upcoming objectives in the TIP and decide if this position will be needed at this time and possibly advertise in the near future, should the decision be made to hire a Transportation Planner.

The Bureau of Indian (BIA) FY 2013 Consolidated Tribal Government Program Budget Justification and Budget has been submitted to the BIA Central California Agency. The Budget has been reduced due to the Federal Government sequester of this year. The FY 2013 budget has been reduced from the proposed amount of \$194,686.00 to \$184,874.00, 5.04% cut of \$9,812.00.

NATIONAL PARK SERVICE (NPS)

On August 5th Ms. Mikaela Griffiths, Environmental Director, Dr. Bonnie Bobb, Environmental Consultant, Ms. Barbara Durham, THPO and myself attended the NPS Environmental Review Committee monthly meeting. These meetings are held monthly on projects within the NPS in reference to the Environmental Screening

from the NPS Environmental Department for approval of each project.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE (IHS)

While at the Nevada/California Housing Association meeting on August 12-14th the new IHS Reno District Director gave a overview of allowable IHS services on housing projects. IHS cannot include actual on the ground construction for HUD funded projects, unless compensated for services, although IHS can provide engineering services including specifications, plans and other engineering recommendations.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA) ARRA GRANT – WILDLAND-URBAN INTERFACE (WUI) PROJECT FUEL REDUCTION PROJECT

The Regional Forester contacted me via e-mail and informed me that he has submitted a request for the remaining amount of funding for this project. As of this newsletter I had a call from the BIA Pacific Region Trust Accounts Specialist informing me the Tribe will need to submit additional paperwork in order to have the remaining funding transferred into the Tribe's account. We will complete this paperwork as soon as possible in order to receive the remaining funding.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON (SCE) GRANT ASSISTANCE FUNDING

On August 19th I received an E-mail from the assistant to the Southern California Edison International Tribal Liaison, informing the Tribe to submit for the

funding cycle for next year's grant (2014) within the next week. As you might recall, the Tribe received a \$25,000.00 grant last January for Phase 1 of the Timbisha Shoshone Tribe Language Educational and Cultural Program for the 2013 year. We have submitted phase 2 for the 2014 Language Educational and Cultural Program grant. We hope to receive this next phase for the same amount, in order to continue the initial start up of the program. We will keep you updated on the status of this grant submittal.

FINANCIAL UPDATE and ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATES

We have the majority of information for the 2012 Audit prepared and in speaking with the Tribe's financial consultant on August 13th the Tribe has sent him a sample printout of the AccuFund balance sheet and he said the format looked good and he would be scheduling a visit or possibly scheduling a visit with one of his financial students to prepare for the 2013 audit this upcoming week.

On August 29th the AccuFund intergrader conducted a series of over-site budget and grant set-up trainings with the Administrative Fiscal Staff on the AccuFund Financial Software program. There will be a follow up session in order to install the additions to the Fiscal Software system for future use. The learning curve on this new system has taken awhile, although the Fiscal staff has made tremendous strides in the operation of the system.

The Indirect Cost Rate (IDC) Proposal Consultant is waiting for the 2012 Financial Audit to be completed before she can finalize the IDC proposal for the Tribe which is to be

submitted. We expect the 2012 Audit to be completed before the end of September 2013.

Unfortunately, the new Water Quality Specialist (WQS) whom was hired had not been able to meet the job requirements and duties. Therefore, we have not recommended her for a permanent full-time position with the Tribe. We have initiated an in-house transfer for the WQS position. Ms. Cathy Cottonwood will be taking the helm of the WQS and we believe she will do an excellent job in this position. We look forward to Cathy in this position.

The Tribe has submitted a BIA Water Planning and Pre-Development grant to the BIA. This grant will be reviewing and updating the water management plan, which was submitted in 2005. The plan would explore whether water is available and in sufficient quantity for each of the anticipated projects on each parcel. Continuing drought conditions and climate change and water conservation methods will be added to the plan. **Phase I** would include development of a vision statement and a survey of Tribal members and Tribal Council to assess future use of parcels. **Phase II** would include procuring technical assistance to quantify water needs. This would include travel funds to attend meetings of non-Tribal entities whose plans impact Tribal water quantity.

Housing Department

As you may know we have been working on getting a crew together to complete the home improvements that need to be done in Death Valley. Tribal Council picked from the pool of applicants and upon informing them of their selection we had one person decline. We do have to re-select another worker before we can start the project.

This month I have been working on the HUD findings and addressing those issues as soon as possible.

We would like to announce that the deadline for submittal of Down Payment/Home Acquisition applications will be September 16th at 5:00pm. At this time we will close applications for this round of selections and we will be making a selection for one Down Payment/Home Acquisition grant award. If you have questions on this grant feel free to get in touch with me ASAP.

LIHEAP closure of grant award year. I would like to announce that the LIHEAP program deadline is within the next few days and I was

informed that we need to spend down our monies that we get through this grant. I would encourage anyone that is low income and in need of help to get in touch with me here at the office. I was able to get the date extended to September 13th which is the final day to submit applications to NCIDC. I will need all applications submitted by September 11th. I know this is short notice it was short notice for the Tribe as well. After this date you may still submit applications, however, the money goes into a pool on a first come first served basis and when it is gone there is no more grant money available until next year. I would also like everyone to know that the tribe will be able to offer wood that was acquired during the WUI Project to qualified LIHEAP applicants. I would like to encourage anyone that needs firewood and is low income to fill out the LIHEAP Application so that we can assist you with acquiring firewood for the upcoming winter.

This will also help us to employ two people to split, load and deliver the wood to the appropriate households that get approved through LIHEAP.

FEMA Acquisition

The Tribe applied for 5 FEMA Trailers recently. We would like to offer these trailers out to Tribal members. For you to be able to qualify and get one of these trailers you must first contact the Tribe and express your interest in

obtaining a trailer. Second you will be required to pay for the transportation costs and setup if necessary. The Tribe will pay the fees upfront and the Tribal member will be required to payback the Tribe for any incurred costs. Keep in mind that these trailers can be transported to almost any location and the closer you are to the transport area the less it will cost you. I would like anyone that has an interest to call me at your earliest convenience so that we can place you on a list to see how many people would like to participate in the program. From these participants we will have you fill out a FEMA Acquisition form to rate all the applicants. If you have any questions, let me know by calling Susan @ (760) 872-3614.



THPO UPDATES

On August 12th I drove to Ridgecrest for a NAWs site visit. I met up with NAWs Tribal Liaison, NAWs Archeologist and other Tribes at the Burro corrals east of Ridgecrest. Other tribes present were Kernville, Ft. Independence, Big Pine and Benton. On August 13th I went on a site-visit for a company which intends to install a communication tower on BLM lands. The National Park Service has no problems with the installation of blinking lights anticipated for the tower and the Tribe has no objections. I checked the area and did not see any cultural items, although I will be talking to the Historic Preservation Committee for additional input on the site location.

On August 14th I drove to Tonopah for a meeting with BLM and a Tribal Cultural Representative from the Duckwater Tribe on a possible open pit-mining project. We met at the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) office with two guys from the mining company. We drove to the site just north of Goldfield. We stopped at various spots where the open pit will be dug, where the leach lines will be placed and where the tailings will be stored. We went back to the BLM office in the afternoon and discussed the project further. BLM didn't have any handouts to give us, but we asked for the Plan of Operation and maps. The cultural report isn't done yet. Will keep you updated on the status of this project.

On August 16th I drove to McCarran Airport and caught my flight to Billings, Montana to attend the National Association of Tribal Historic Preservation Officers Annual Meeting.

Please excuse the short article as I was on travel status within the past few weeks.

There will be a China Lake Naval Weapons Tribal Leadership meeting on September 12th at Coso Village.

Water Quality Specialist Updates

Good day Timbisha Shoshone Tribal Members. I would like to start off by welcoming our new Environmental Director Mikaela on board. It's been a joy working with her and our Consultant Bonnie Bob. We have traveled to Scotty's Junction to investigate the dump area on Timbisha Shoshone's parcel of land where there is a dumpsite. We are starting a dumpsite clean up at the Timbisha Shoshone Tribal Village, starting clean up date will be Sept. 9th to Sept. 13th. There will be a 30 yard dumpster bin at this dumpsite. We will have two laborers on board to help with the clean up and recycling of the dumpsite. Also there will be a dump trailer arriving at each of the TS Tribal member yards to haul away any unwanted material or recyclables. The 30 yard bin will stay at the dumpsite area for 5 days, if needed we can extend it a little longer.

During this time there will be a Noxious Weeds removal from the dry stream-bank located on the north side of the Timbisha Shoshone Tribal office. The noxious weeds will then be delivered to the 30 yard dumpster at the dump-site. This is under NPS-319 Nonpoint source Pollution Control and is in the FY 2013 work plan. The Tribal work project is to manually remove Invasive Species in a non-chemical manner, particularly the salt Tamarisks. We are excited to dig in and clean up the Tribal village dump and to remove harmful contaminants out of this area of land. EPA UPDATES

Hi everybody!

My name is Mikaela Griffiths and I would like to introduce myself as the new Environmental Director for the Timbisha Shoshone Tribe. This past May, I graduated from the University of Wyoming with a Bachelor of Science in Sociology, but I grew up in Bishop and I couldn't be happier to start a career here. For the past couple weeks, I have been working closely with the rest of the environmental staff to complete the commitments made for the GAP (General Assistance Program) grant.



Currently, the biggest priority for the environmental department is cleaning up the solid waste dumpsites in Death Valley Indian Village, Scotty's Junction and Lida. These dump sites are filled with various solid waste items ranging from glass bottles and rusty metal cans to old appliances and car tires. The cleanup of these sites will begin on September 3rd and will take an estimated 3-4 weeks to complete. The environmental department will be hiring two laborers to help complete this task: as advertised on the Timbisha website and in both Tribal Offices. Once the sites are cleaned up, we will be putting up signs to prevent future dumping; and we will also be building a small dump site at the Death Valley Indian Village (a ramp that leads to a garbage bin) to allow the members in the village to dispose of large solid waste.

Another priority for the environmental department is to include Tribal members in what we're doing as much as possible. Therefore, the environmental department (with help from the IT department) has created a link on the Timbisha website. This link will provide Tribal members with information about what's going on in the environmental department; there will be environmental updates and issues, important dates and other information related to the environmental department and staff. For example, the environmental department will be hosting two meet-and-greets: a luncheon in Death Valley on September 6 and a brunch in Bishop on September 14 (these will be advertised on the website and invitations will be out shortly). These meet-and-greets will allow Tribal members to get to know the environmental staff, ask questions about what the environmental department is doing and provide feedback for the plans we have. The meet-and-greets will be a fun time and I hope to see you all there!

Lastly, I have been working on the Timbisha Shoshone Tribe's Emergency Response Notification Plan (ERNP) for the Death Valley Indian Village. This plan is somewhat of a 'how-to' manual in the event that an emergency occurs (what to do in certain emergencies, important phone numbers, maps, etc.). I have been corresponding with other Tribe's environmental directors for assistance in creating this plan, but would love to hear any and all suggestions from members living in the village (as you know what specific needs you might have in an emergency more than I do).

I am very excited about this position and I look forward to meeting all of you.

For years, California tribes celebrated the fourth Friday of September by renewing their ties to the Earth and keeping alive the ways of their ancestors. It was in 1998 when California Legislature passed the bill establishing the day as an official day of education. Today, people of all ages celebrate California Native American Day by learning more about the culture, heritage and traditions of the California Indians


